Prayers

*I will give you thanks, O Lord, among the peoples,

During the weeks of **Advent** look forward in preparation to the great **Feast of Christmas**, that it may break upon us with joy, to greet the birth of the Christ child, our Saviour. Pray that it may be a time of rejoicing within the family of Christians throughout the world. Pray for Christians communities who are oppressed for their faith in the hope that they may become able to worship without fear. Give thanks for the love of your own family and greet them in your prayers as you greet them in person. Bring before God the lonely at this time: people who know loneliness when others are spending the season happily together. Especially pray for those who have nowhere to live and for organisations who make it their business to care for them, for example Crisis who organise hostels for the single homeless, or any others you may know.

On the 26th the **Festival of Stephen**, the First Martyr, pray for strength that you may bear worthy witness of your own faith. On the 27th, the **Festival of John**, Apostle and Evangelist, give thanks for his example of service and for his Gospel. Ask that all those who read it may find enlightenment. On the 28th, the **Festival of the Holy Innocents**, pray for children everywhere, especially those who are forced into child labour and those who know only lives of suffering. That they may find relief and protection in the comforts and joys of childhood.

We are asked to pray for the churches situated around Bredon Hill , those grouped around Pershore and for the International Students spending Christmas in Worcester.

Ask God to shine the light of his wisdom on those whose responsibility it is to **govern** and **guide** their people, in the hope that we may see peaceful and prosperous **communities** developing. Especially in need of guidance are the people of Libya as they work to establish a new, democratic government, uniting the many different factions. Pray they may be ready to forgive past misdeeds in the cause of an assured future.

Throughout the holiday period **hospitals** and **emergency services** will continue to work as usual. Ask for the Holy Spirit to inspire them in their duties of bringing aid and relief to those who need immediate help and treatment and for those needing longer attention; help those who care for them to exercise their skills with consideration for their patients' demands. Pray for the **patients** who will spend this Christmas in hospital away from their loved ones, that they may find patience and comfort together with the joys of the festive season to share with their fellow patients. Remember their families who are anxious for them.

It's nearly Christmas 2011! All the preparations have to be made; the presents thoughtfully chosen and daintily wrapped, the cards to write and send, the food shopping and fancy goods.

Decorations need to be retrieved or replaced so that your home glitters. Throughout Advent there is an anticipation that something great is about to happen. For children it might be Father Christmas and all those presents. For adults it might be the joy of spending time with the family.



I believe that there are many layers to Christmas. What do you think is the most important thing about Christmas? It is a good question to ask and one that will vary. Some parents declare that Christmas is for the children, and it's their duty to make it a magical time with lots of presents. Unfortunately this misses the point; Christmas is about being prepared to let Christ into your life, and to celebrate His Birth.

Another way of looking at it is like this: you may imagine that for faithful Christians most of the preparations appear to be similar to the icing on the cake: the real substance is hidden from view but we know it is there! At the heart of Christmas lie truths profound and moving. That God entered our world as a baby for the purpose of redeeming it: Christmas is about Christ.

On that first Christmas Mary and Joseph must have had a sense of anticipation. They had done their best to make ready for the arrival of their baby. Joseph had found a place in a stable at the back of an Inn where Mary could give birth. Amidst the straw they waited as Mary went into labour. There is simplicity to this scene which resonates with the birth of every baby into the world. The juxtaposition of the pain of labour and then the joy as this new small baby is born. Ironically this new King who would redeem himself for us, came into the world so vulnerable, yet an object of wonder.

What a privilege it must have been to be present at the birth of Jesus. God had allowed himself to be that vulnerable baby, and this is the joy which gives meaning to our Christmas celebrations, and about which we sing in our Carols. It is the real Christmas, the first Christmas.

All the trimmings, decorations and presents only have meaning if Jesus is at the heart of it all. How empty must it feel to celebrate Christmas without Jesus? Even as a child I was aware of the meaning of Christmas, although the presents did seem to occupy my mind! During my teenage years I discovered the depth to Christmas in the midnight communion service, which made all the festivities that much more enjoyable. The words:

'Unto you is born this day a Saviour' have special meaning when you hear and receive them on Christmas day.

This December let us receive Jesus who was, and is, Christmas:

'O Holy Child of Bethlehem descend to us we pray. Cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today!'

The Mission of the Church

Financial Costs

To carry out our work in the church and community we need a secure income. Christians are expected to contribute a proportion of their income to support the work of the church. The PCC is very grateful to those who contribute regularly – either through the Envelope Scheme or through a Regular Payment from their bank account. These methods allow the budget for the year to be planned and help the PCC with their task as 'good stewards' of our financial resources.

As we approach the start of the New Year we invite those who are not part of the Regular Giving Scheme to consider joining and those who presently contribute through the scheme to review their giving. A contribution of 50p per week amounts to £26 for the whole year and £10 per week would provide us with an income of £520 over the year.

If you would like to know more, please talk to one of the churchwardens (Gabrielle or Michael) or to the treasurer (Cath) or to Shirley who looks after the envelope scheme on behalf of the PCC.

If you are a tax payer we would encourage you to Gift Aid your giving. This does not involve any effort on your behalf but the church can claim 25p for every £1 you give. So a regular contribution of 50p a week will be worth £32.50 a year to us; £10 per week 'gift aided' would be worth an extra £130 over the course of the year. It is always good to get some benefit from the tax you pay!

Many people in the community have said they would want to secure the church for future generations. Even if you don't come to church you can still contribute to help ensure its future. What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: John

'I like the comparison of John's Gospel to a pool in which a child may wade and an elephant can swim. It is both simple and profound. It is for the beginner in the faith and for the mature Christian.' (Leon Morris).

The Apostle John is usually credited with the authorship of the fourth Gospel, writing in Ephesus (Asia Minor) at the end of the First Century. John writes 'that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.' (20:31). He stresses the deity of Christ, and presents Jesus as the Son of God. His gospel is quite different in character from the three synoptic gospels, with different stories, but highly literary and symbolic.

The prologue (1:1-14) brings together the gospel's major themes, like an overture in a musical work. John proclaims Jesus as the pre-existent and incarnate Word of God revealed by the Father to us. Throughout the gospel many references are made to Jesus' deity. Most notably Jesus declares, 'Before Abraham was born, I am!' (8:57-58), referring to Exodus, where God describes himself as 'I am.' John also presents the contrast of darkness and light; Jesus has come as light into the world so that those who believe in him will not remain in darkness (cf 12:46).

The heart of John's narrative contains seven signs or miracles, which demonstrate who Jesus is and show his creative and transforming power over creation and in people's lives:

- turning water into wine at Cana (2:1-11)
- healing of the royal official's son (4:46-54)
- healing of the paralytic at the pool (5:1-18)
- feeding of the 5000 (6:1-14)
- walking on the waters of the Sea of Galilee (6:16-21)
- healing of the man born blind (9:1-41)
- raising of Lazarus (11:1-44).

After these signs, Jesus 'hour' arrives, and the story moves into the discourses in the upper room that interpret the meaning of the death, and resurrection narratives that follow. The whole gospel is a progressive revelation of the glory of God's only Son, who comes to reveal the Father and then returns in glory to the Father.

It can be well summed up in its most famous verse:

'For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' (John 3:16).

Saint Nicholas – December 6

Father Christmas seems to be as old as Europe. Once he was Woden, lashing his reindeer through the darkness of northern midwinter. Then he encountered the Church, and She transformed him into a saint, the much-loved Nicholas, Bishop of Myra (in south-west Turkey) in the fourth century. St Nicholas became the patron saint of children, and was given 6 December as his day.

Since the 6th century St Nicholas has been venerated in both East and West, though virtually nothing is known of his life. Some believe he may have been one of the fathers at the Council of Nicea (325), imprisoned during the Emperor Diocletian's persecution.

According to legend, Nicholas was an extremely generous man. He revived three schoolboys murdered by an innkeeper in a tub of pickles. He rescued three young women from prostitution by giving their poverty-stricken father three bags of gold. (Hence the use of three gold balls as the pawnbroker's signs.)

Over the centuries many, including children, sailors, unmarried girls, pawnbrokers and moneylenders have claimed him as their patron.

Perhaps it was on account of S Nicholas' generosity that in recent centuries children began to write little notes sometime before 6 December, to tell him about the toys they specially wanted. These notes were then left on the windowsill at night - or else on a ledge in the chimney.

But St Nicholas Day chanced to lie in the magnetic field of a much more potent festival.... and after awhile his activities were moved towards Christmas. Then in Bavaria the children still left their notes on the window sill, but they addressed them to Liebes Christkind - Krishkinkle as they knew him - and the saint's part in the matter was simply to deliver the letters in heaven.

The most popular result of the cult of St Nicholas has been the institution of Santa Claus. He is based on Nicholas' patronage of children and the custom in the Low Countries of giving presents on his feast. Santa Claus has reached his zenith in America, where the Dutch Protestants of New Amsterdam (New York) united to it Nordic folklore legends of a magician who both punished naughty children and rewarded good ones with presents.

Community Survey Results

Introduction

69 people completed the survey – thanks to them for giving up their time. Thanks also to the members of the congregation who asked the questions. This is a great response and one we can use to take the church forward.

Not all the questions were answered and some people gave more than one response. So the results will be shown as percentages and the total may add up to more than 100%. Results are presented without any analysis.

The majority of forms had no additional comments; those remarks which are recorded therefore represent a minority.
